PROJECT UPDATES

Another classroom added to Natema Primary School

Classroom construction at Natema Primary School in Arumeru District, Tanzania is nearing completion. Only painting walls and installing window glass remains to be finished.

Students and teachers will begin using the classroom the first week of January 2009, when the new school year begins in Tanzania.

This project began in 2001 with the first downstairs classroom built by Terrawatu. The local community provides the labour.

Funding for materials and a civil engineer to complete this second classroom was provided by friend of Terrawatu, Donna Fallin, from Bentonville, Arkansas.

Headteacher Victor Mollel of Natema Primary School, says "I am very happy to hear the classroom is complete. The parents of the children are very happy and send blessings to Terrawatu." Over one thousand students attend Natema and over-crowded classroom conditions has been hampering educational progress for many years.

There is a cement foundation in place for a third classroom on the ground level. Terrawatu is working with a group of university students from the United States to fundraise for the materials to complete this project.

Prototypes of Maasai Bag Available

Prototypes of the Maasai Bag handmade in the village of Mkonoo, Tanzania are available.

Terrawatu has been working with the women's network of Mkonoo for years, facilitating the creation of a tree nursery that has planted thousands of indigenous trees in the village.

The Maasai bag project began two years ago as a way to develop a very high-quality product that would bring income to the community.

The design is in the shape of the traditional bag used to carry water by Maasai women. The leather is sourced locally in Tanzania and the beadwork and assembly are done by hand in the village. Each bag is different.

When asked what the ladies plan to do with the income they earn from selling these special bags, "We plan to pay school fees for our children and purchase more materials to make more bags and jewelry."

Recipe

Sweet Potato Cookies

A fantastic Christmas cookie! Originally from Malawi, you can cut them in the shape of a heart to honor the people in the "warm heart of Africa."

What you need:

- 1 cup mashed sweet potato
- ¼ cup milk
- 1 egg, lightly beaten
- 4 tablespoons melted butter
- 1 ¼ cups sifted flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 cup sugar
- ½ teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- ¹/₂ cup sultanas (raisins)

What you do:

- Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Mix sweet potatoes, milk, egg and melted butter and beat well. Stir in the remaining ingredients.
- Chill 1-2 hours then turn onto a floured board, knead lightly and roll out ½-inch thick. Cut with a cookie cutter. Place cookies on a greased baking sheet, and bake for 15 minutes. Sprinkle some cinnamon/sugar mixture on top.
